





UK universities are ensuring campuses are as safe as possible for students and staff in line with the latest public health guidance – including practising physical distancing on campus, laboratories and other buildings, and continuing support for staff and student wellbeing.

Face coverings

It is recommended that you wear a face covering in the UK in crowded and enclosed spaces, where you come into contact with people you don't usually meet. In some areas (such as London and Scotland), it is mandatory to wear a face covering on public transport, so check the rules for the part of the UK you are studying in for the latest guidance.





How UK universities are looking after student wellbeing

All universities are working hard to welcome international students and have action procedures in place to keep students, staff and local communities safe.

UK universities have implemented a number of Covid-19 support services that international students can access, such as airport pick up services, support through self-isolation periods and food packages. Universities are also offering increased mental health support during the pandemic, with many putting initiatives in place which support students in keeping active and that help them to socialise safely. This includes online activities that facilitate students meeting others during periods when they are required to selfisolate, or for those who are unable to travel to the UK just yet. They also have plans in place to support students if they are required to self-isolate or if local lockdowns are introduced.

If any international students are struggling or have any concerns, we would encourage them to contact their university's student support services.

A programme of mental health support for students during Covid-19, Student Space, has been created for students in England and Wales. How to apply

We're open for recruitment to international students in 2022-23 and we will do all that we can to support students making this choice.

For students who intend to study in the UK in 2022-23, here is the latest guidance to help them prepare.

Applying for a visa

The UK government is working to ensure that existing processes are as flexible as possible, so that international students who are planning to study in the UK can do so.

Students need only apply for their visa when they can actually travel to the UK, they can study remotely without one until then.

Paying the Immigration Health Surcharge

International students (outside the European Economic Area) will need to pay a healthcare surcharge as part of their immigration application. This costs £470 per year for a student, giving access to NHS services without further charge, subject to a few exceptions such as prescription charges in England.

The surcharge levels remain competitive compared with health insurance requirements in comparable countries. The surcharge represents about one per cent of the total cost of studying in the UK for a three-year undergraduate course.

Taking English language tests

Students should check with their university for the latest advice on how they can provide suitable evidence of their English proficiency.

You can advise students that they should visit the IETS website for the latest updates on IELTS test arrangements. www.ielts.org

Students may be able to take the IELTS Indicator – an online test, taken at home and marked by IELTS examiners. This is available in some countries for those who are unable to attend an IELTS test centre due to Covid-19 restrictions.

The IELTS Indicator is not available in China, so Chinese students are taking the TOEFL English exam, since China's Ministry of Education and US-based ETS have announced the alignment of the TOEFL iBT test to China's Standards of English framework. toefl.neea.cn

Some universities are accepting the Duolingo English Test as certification of English proficiency, another online test available to international students, please visit englishtest.duolingo.com

PTE Academic assesses listening, reading, speaking and writing all via computer in a single three hour test session. Visit pearsonpte.com

Anyone who has been affected by the suspension of other language tests should contact their test provider with any enquiries.

Covid-19 has highlighted the crucial role that universities play in developing and sharing knowledge, bringing together the best minds and facilitating collaborative research to meet the challenge of the pandemic – epidemiologists are sharing their expertise and virologists are leading the development of vaccinations.

Across the world, many countries are continuing to adapt and respond to the current crisis by finding new ways of delivering services and managing our everyday lives. Education provision is also affected and students can expect some things to be different. But universities by nature are innovative environments and they will adapt and evolve to continue to deliver world-class tuition to their students.

Making the decision to leave home and move to another country to study at a university brings challenges for international students, but it also indicates a strong will to embrace change and discover new ways of learning.

UK universities have now returned to face-to-face teaching but you can read about their approach to blended learning below.

Blended learning

Across the UK, quality teaching is taking place. Universities have been providing high quality, flexible options to international students since the start of the pandemic, such as studying online or facilitating later start dates.

There are some exciting and innovative examples of high-quality online learning being delivered by institutions across the UK. For example, some universities have created virtual ward rounds with virtual patients to mimic clinical decision making for their medical students, while others have developed new ways for students to conduct field work, including the use of hi-res photographs, Google Earth and drone-scans.

When safe to do so and in line with government guidelines, teaching is being delivered through a mix of formats (known as 'blended learning'). Under a blended model, lectures may be delivered online, supported by online discussions. Courses that involve practical teaching sessions will be delivered in a safe way, with physical distancing and personal protective equipment provided where appropriate.

Some face-to-face study takes place under a blended learning model, in small groups that are made safer through the creation of 'bubbles'. This means the same group of students will be taught together throughout the term.

Teaching through blended learning means the safety of students and staff remains top priority, and high-quality teaching can continue.

All learning is being regularly reviewed in line with local public health guidelines.

Share our online course – Prepare to study and live in the UK

Hosted on the FutureLearn online course platform, this four-week online course will teach students everything they need to know about UK higher education, including teaching methods, course structures and how coursework will be assessed. It will also provide them with tips for studying in the English language and practical information about living in the UK.

By completing the online course, they will be more confident, feel better prepared, and get the most from their experience of studying and living in the UK. During the course, there will also be plenty of opportunities for them to interact with other, like-minded individuals who are preparing for their UK education. Who knows, they may even start making friends before they arrive in the UK.

The online course is entirely free and takes only four weeks to complete, although students can complete it faster if they wish. Upon successful completion, students will receive a digital certificate.

Travel

Please see the latest information on entering the UK on www.gov.uk/uk-border-control Students should also check travel advice in their own country in advance of making their plans. Remember that travel and quarantine rules are subject to change at short notice, so students should continue to check the latest rules and stay in touch with their institution for information and support.

Universities are ensuring students know what to expect before they travel, and are welcomed and supported on arrival. Some universities have arranged airport pickup services, and many are offering support through any quarantine period students are required to complete under government guidelines.



Free NHS treatment

International students who live in the UK and are registered with a GP (general practitioner) will be able to access the Covid-19 vaccination in the UK, just as they are currently able to access healthcare.



STUDY NK

From 1 July 2021, international students are able to benefit from two years' work experience in the UK after graduation, through the new Graduate Route. Students who complete their PhD will be able to stay for three years.

Here is everything you need to know to advise your students:

- The Graduate Route is available to international students who have a valid student visa at the time of application and have successfully completed a degree at undergraduate level or above at a higher Education provider with a track record of compliance.
- Successful applicants will be able to stay and work, or look for work, in the UK at any skill level for a maximum period of two years. Graduates will be able to switch into skilled work once they have found a suitable job.
- The new route opened for applications on 1 July 2021, meaning that any eligible student who graduated in the summer of 2021 or after will be able to apply for the route. This includes students who have already started their courses.

- The Graduate Route will require a new visa application.
- It will include the payment of a visa fee and the Immigration Health Surcharge. The exact fee will be set out in due course.

The UK government has confirmed that students will not be penalised for beginning their courses online, and will still qualify for the Graduate Route provided they complete the final semester of their studies in the UK. 





APPLYING TO STUDY



STUDY NK

The UK is open and we're welcoming applications for the 2022-23 intake and we would encourage you to direct students to our university finder tool to search for courses.

To support students in submitting their application, we have a set of videos that you can use to inform students about the application process to study in the UK.

Most undergraduate applications are made through the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS). To apply through UCAS, students need to go to www.ucas.com and register their details in their application system. Students can apply for up to five courses through UCAS and will be contacted by them with any offers from their chosen universities or colleges.

Application deadlines

15 October

For courses at the universities of Oxford and Cambridge and for most courses in medicine, veterinary medicine, science and dentistry.

26 January

For most undergraduate courses

30 June

Late deadline for most undergraduate courses. Applications received after this deadline will automatically go into 'Clearing', so students will not be guaranteed your first choice.

While students will be able to apply after the January deadline right up until 30 June, it is better to apply early.

What is Clearing?

Clearing is how universities and colleges in the UK fill any places they still have on their courses.

From 6 July to 20 October, applicants can apply for a course using Clearing if they're not already holding an offer from a university or college, and the course still has places.

Applicants can use Clearing if:

- they're applying after 30 June
- they didn't receive any offers (or none they wanted to accept)
- they didn't meet the conditions of their offers
- they've declined their firm place using the 'decline my place' button in Track.



Useful tips for applying through Clearing.

Encourage applicants to:

- ask for advice
- see what courses are available by using the search tool on UCAS and check entry requirementsconsider different subjects
- talk to the universities they are interested in

STUDY SK

Around 147,800 students from EU countries study in the UK (2019–20 data) – that's some 30 per cent of the UK's total international students. Students and staff from the EU make an enormous contribution to the UK and the success of its education institutions.

The UK has now left the European Union. This will mean some changes for students from EU, other EEA countries or Switzerland who start a UK course from 1 January 2021 onwards.

- Arrived by 31 December 2020: Have 'home fee status' for the full duration of their course, and do not need to apply for a visa. If they plan to stay in the UK after 30 June 2021, they should apply to the EU Settlement Scheme once they are in the UK.
- Arrive after 1 January 2021 to start a course in the 2020–21 academic year (course starts before 31 July 2021): Remain eligible for home fee status and student loans subject to meeting the residency requirements, need to apply for a student visa before travelling to the UK.
- Arrive in the UK / start a course after 1 August 2021: Not eligible for home fee status or student loans, need to apply for a student visa before travelling to the UK.


