Take the Digital Challenge!


This time of isolation has prompted us to utilize more virtual strategies for faith formation. For many of us, this is new terrain.

Create a Parish Facebook Account

Already have one? Then consider starting a Facebook Group for a specific demographic like your catechists, parents of First Holy Communion children, or new families in your program.

Create a YouTube Channel

Create a Faith Formation Website

This can be a page on your parish website or ask your pastor if you can create a faith formation site linked from your parish site. Upload seasonal content for families to encourage faith at home. Create an Instagram Account

Already have one? Consider giving families a theme for photos (e.g. "Enjoying God's Creation") then have them direct message (on Instagram) the photos. Post these to the parish Instagram feed and/or Instagram Story feature while tagging the family. Go Liv€

Consider going live with a presentation for your parish community. This allows families to interact during the presentation with comments and dialogue. You can go live on Facebook, YouTube or Instagram.
