Gustavo Dudamel

2009-present

Now in his role as Music & Artistic Director, Dudamel marks a milestone in the fall of 2019 - ten years since he first became our Music Director. Dudamel leads the LA Phil in 20 programs this season, beginning with the genre-bending LA Fest (Oct 4-14). His other highlights include: an unprecedented collaboration with choreographer Benjamin Millepied in Prokofiev's Romeo and Juliet (Oct 18-21); the world premiere of John Adams' piano concerto with Yuja Wang (Mar 7-10); the complete cycle of Beethoven Piano Concertos with Lang Lang (May 17-24); and the season-ending spectacle of Mahler's Eighth Symphony (May 30-Jun 2).

Esa-Pekka Salonen

1992-2009

Salonen's deep affinity for **Stravinsky** bursts forth over two weekends that focus on the composer's music in the realms of Faith, Rituals and Myths (*Apr 12-20*). Now our Conductor Laureate, Salonen will also explore **The Weimar Republic** – a look at the expressive explosion during the Weimar era, with soprano **Audra McDonald** (*Apr 26-28*). Finally, he will lead the world premiere of our latest commission from Dutch master **Louis Andriessen** (*May 2-5*).

Zubin Mehta

1962-1978

Mehta will conduct a **Brahms Cycle** that matches the composer's four concertos with his four symphonies, each a distinctive artistic monument. Heavy hitters **Yefim Bronfman** and **Pinchas Zukerman** will be Mehta's collaborators (Dec 13-Jan 6).

CREATIVE CHAIR FOR JAZZ

Herbie Hancock

Herbie Hancock isn't only a legend of jazz; he's a consummate collaborator, bringing musical worlds together in unprecedented ways. His vision continues to shape our jazz series, which he kicks off this season during LA Fest in collaboration with Dudamel and the LA Phil (Oct 13). Also – for the first time ever – Herbie is curating an entire Green Umbrella program of new music from artists who are working at the border between composed and improvisational music (Jan 15).

ARTIST-COLLABORATOR

Yuval Sharon

MacArthur Fellow **Yuval Sharon** has already made a huge impression on the LA Phil and its audiences with challenging and innovative projects that upend assumptions about what an orchestra should do. This season he puts his distinctive mark on **John Cage's** *Europeras* 1 and 2 (*Nov* 6, 10, 11), curates a reality sound-walk by **Cardiff+Miller**, and directs **Meredith Monk's** haunting three-act opera ATLAS (*Jun* 11-12).

PRINCIPAL GUEST CONDUCTOR

Susanna Mälkki

In our 2017/18 season, **Susanna Mälkki** became the LA Phil's first Principal Guest Conductor in a generation. The Finnish musician has already awed critics and audiences alike with the insight, energy and breadth of her music-making. She returns with a new production of **The Tempest**, combining director **Barry Edelstein's** vision of the magical play with music by Sibelius (Nov 8-10). She also leads the world premiere of a commissioned piece by **Steve Reich**, matched with **Mahler** (Nov 1-4), and pairs **Messiaen's** vast *Turangalīla Symphony* with **Kaija Saariaho's** harp concerto, *Trans* (Jan 18-20). For a **Green Umbrella** program, she premieres four new works from the leading edge of the European avant-garde (Nov 13).

Advancing Our Art



CREATIVE CHAIR

John Adams

A trusted advisor to Gustavo Dudamel, composer John Adams has helped shape our seasons through his ceaseless curiosity and insightful musical perspective. For our centennial celebrations, Adams is composing a new piano concerto, to feature Yuja Wang (Mar 7-10), which Gustavo and the orchestra will also take on tour. John also presents five world premieres at the last Green Umbrella concert of the season (Jun 1). His music will be featured at the Opening Night Concert & Gala: California Soul (Sep 27), and he'll conduct his own work on a program with a Philip Glass world premiere (Jan 10, 11, 13).



The horizons of music are constantly expanding. We've commissioned 50 new works from an astounding group of artists intent upon proving just that. Throughout the 2018/19 season, our audiences will be the first in the world to hear major works from titans such as John Adams, Louis Andriessen, Unsuk Chin, Philip Glass and Steve Reich, and pioneering young composers such as Julia Adolphe, Ashley Fure, Andrew Norman, Tyshawn Sorey, Kamasi Washington and Du Yun.

LA Fest

The Music of Our City

Los Angeles has a brimming musical mix all its own. The LA Phil has thrilled audiences and won wide acclaim with our multi-faceted celebrations of musical capitals around the world. This season, we begin with LA Fest, a festival in which we turn our attention to the city that has been inspiring us for 100 years.

Gustavo Dudamel opens with a concert exploring the virtuosity of the LA Phil and its own composers – Conductor Laureate **Esa–Pekka Salonen** and **Andrew Norman**, Director of our Composer Fellowship Program (*Oct 4–6*).

Norman curates a **Green Umbrella** program, with Dudamel leading the LA Phil New Music Group in contemporary music from Southern California (*Oct 9*).

Each of our non-classical series launches during this festival, including collaborations between L.A.-based artists and Dudamel with the LA Phil. **Herbie Hancock** kicks off our Jazz series (*Oct 13*), and **Andrew Bird** will join us for the first Songbook event (*Oct 11*). And in a special non-subscription concert for the festival, the orchestra will be joined by revolutionary L.A. artist/musician **Moby** (*Oct 12*).

Innovative choreographer and L.A. Dance Project Artistic Director **Benjamin Millepied** joins **Dudamel** and the **LA Phil**, bringing to vivid life the famous balcony scene from Prokofiev's *Romeo and Juliet* – one of dance's most evocative and vibrant scores – in collaboration with **American Ballet Theatre** and **L.A. Dance Project**.

FLUXUS

Fluxus was a wily, nebulous – and deeply influential – anti-establishment current founded in the 1960s. An international collective of artists, composers, and poets, Fluxus aimed to collapse what it considered the false wall between art and life. In a survey curated by **Christopher Rountree** in collaboration with the Getty Research Institute, the often-humorous, frequently challenging music and performances of Fluxus will be presented on– and off-site, including an orchestral subscription concert at Walt Disney Concert Hall.

Stanley Kubrick's Sound Odyssey


Stanley Kubrick often rejected original scores in favor of existing or reworked renditions of classical compositions, and he used them so effectively that they've become shorthand for his entire style: think of the soft waltz of "The Blue Danube" in **2001: A Space Odyssey** and the howl of Wendy Carlos' switched-on Purcell and Beethoven in **A Clockwork Orange.** Accompanied by clips from those two films and more, the LA Phil will take you through a tribute to the pioneering director.

The film scores of John Williams don't simply color the scene; they enrich it, adding a level of emotional detail that frequently elevates them into icons of American culture. **Gustavo Dudamel** pays tribute with a program dedicated to some of Williams' most beloved and adventurous work, enhanced with film montages.

Celebrate Chinese New Year

Former Dudamel Fellow **Elim Chan** conducts an East-West slate of dance music, including an LA Phil-commissioned world premiere from **Du Yun**, winner of the 2017 Pulitzer Prize for Music for her opera *Angel's Bone*. Dazzling young violinist **Ray Chen** joins to play music by Saint-Saëns and Ravel.

Gustavo Dudamel takes the podium to lead the U.S. premiere of **Tan Dun's Buddha** *Passion*, another LA Phil commission. The Oscar®- and Grammy®-winning composer's new oratorio is inspired by paintings from the Dunhuang Cave Temples, whose images will be projected in a video installation for these performances.

William Grant Still & the Harlem Renaissance

William Grant Still moved to Los Angeles in the 1930s to arrange for films, and he conducted the LA Phil at the Hollywood Bowl in 1936. But before that, he was a prominent band and radio arranger in 1920's New York City, where he was a friend and collaborator with figures such as Langston Hughes and became part of the influential Harlem Renaissance. The LA Phil and conductor Thomas Wilkins place two of Stills' blues-drenched symphonies in the context of music by contemporaries George Gershwin and Duke Ellington, plus the world premiere of a new LA Phil commission by Adolphus Hailstork paying homage to Still.
