Transportation

Public transportation in Panamá is primarily a system of buses. There is one Metro line in operation, with a second due to open in 2018. As with all WYDs, we expect the public transportation system to be strained by the volume of pilgrims moving throughout the city.

To help our pilgrims avoid unnecessary delays and confusion, we have reserved hotels in a safe neighborhood at the center of the city. This way, JMJyouth pilgrims are within walking distance of the main events and other popular destinations, and will have fewer occasions to depend on buses and metro trains.

Food & Drink

Food in Panamá is very diverse, and restaurants can be found for most cuisines. The local food is typical of Latin American countries, and notably includes rice, beans, grilled meats, tamales, and other corn-based dishes. Tap water is drinkable in Panamá City, and pilgrims will be encouraged to refill bottles frequently.

The WYD Committee has yet to determine how they will provide meals to pilgrims. In our preliminary meetings, we recommended a return to the debit card system used in Rio de Janeiro in 2013. Under this program, pilgrims would receive a debit-style card with credit that can be redeemed for lunches and dinners at any participating restaurant. Most restaurants choose to participate with this style of program, giving pilgrims a variety of options in every part of the city. However, it is possible that the committee may choose to use a system of meal vouchers, as was used in Krakow in 2016.

Health Considerations

Panamá City has a strong healthcare system. It is expected that your WYD Registration will include health insurance to cover first-aid and emergency care during WYD Week. As an additional layer of protection, JMJyouth will have a staff doctor on-call 24/7 to assist pilgrims in need of medical attention or advice.

Panamá does not require any special vaccinations for its visitors. Travelers typically are concerned about contracting mosquito-borne illnesses, including Malaria, Yellow Fever, and Zika Virus. The risk of these diseases is very limited in the city. None the less, pilgrims should take the added precautions of wearing long sleeves and pants, and using DEET mosquito repellent.

Safety

Like major cities in the United States, Panamá City is very safe, although certain neighborhoods attract more crime and should be avoided. For this reason, standard safety precautions should be observed by pilgrims at all times.

Your JMJyouth WYD Guide will assist your group in learning safe travel habits during your city tour. In the event of an emergency, our Panamá City office and network of WYD Guides are prepared and available to assist your pilgrims.




















MAIN EVENTS (Opening Mass, Papal Welcome, and Way of the Cross) will be held in Cinta Costera, a park along the coast of the Panamá Bay. The adjacent street(s) will be closed prior to and during each event, and will re-open afterward to ease traffic as pilgrims disperse.

ENGLISH-LANGUAGE CATECHESIS has not yet been assigned a location.

YOUTH FESTIVAL activities will be spread throughout the city, including some large arenas.

The VIGIL & CLOSING MASS will take place at Panamá Pacifico, an airport located about 10 miles west of downtown Panamá City. Pilgrims will cross the iconic Bridge of the Americas on their pilgrim walk.
