



Furthermore, Karen is non-verbal. Her time in the institution had been colored by isolation and because of this, she had developed few communication skills.

She also uses sign language to communicate and is more engaged with people—she smiles and makes eye contact.

Perhaps the best example of how far she has come is her reaction to a visit from her dad. "She looked out the window, ran outside, and gave him a big hug. He couldn't remember the last time she did something like that and was amazed," said Kim, Karen's Program Manager.

In just two-and-a-half years, Karen has come a long way from where she started and seems to be happier than ever before. "I can see so much more coming for her as time goes on. She is so funny and is really smart," reports Kim.

More change is on the horizon for Karen—she is preparing to move into a new house and will also gain a new roommate. Her story shows the dangers of making assumptions about someone's ability and the wonderful outcomes that can be achieved when an individual is supported and encouraged to direct their own life.
