Music with Ms Linda Class Information

The music program I will be teaching your children is loosely based on the Dalcroze Method of teaching musical concepts through movement. A variety of movement analogues are used for musical concepts, to develop an integrated and natural feel for musical expression.

Each 30 minute class we will combine music and movement in order to develop rhythmic unity between the eyes, ears, mind and body. Children will learn the basics of following directions, socialization, sharing, taking turns, and expressing ideas.

- 1. We will be singing using a micro and macro beat
- 2. We will be doing vocables (vocal sounds or syllables)
- 3. Dancing as a group and in pairs
- 4. Improvising through props, drums, bells, egg shakers, scarves, streamers both small and large, jingle bells, dyna bands, parachute, resonator bells, bubbles and hula hoops etc.
- 5. Each week we use a large box of instruments that include, tambourines, cymbals, caterpillar, tone blocks, triangle, xylophones, maracas, popsicle drums, etc
- 6. Using our entire body to express ourselves musically in a nurturing environment.
