Is there a curriculum for babies? Ask to see an example of activities planned.
What resources are offered to parents?
Are there opportunities for parents to meet together and be involved as a group?
Is the program accredited by or working toward accreditation by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC)?
Are there enrichments for infants such as storytellers, musicians, sign language, etc.?
Is the daily schedule adjusted according to each baby's needs or are all babies on the same schedule?
Is there a process for preparing parents and children for their first day at the center?
