A Message From the President



Fall is quickly approaching and it will soon be time to go to the polls and vote. Before you make your way to the ballot box, I hope that you will review and consider the voting records of your state representative and senator on issues involving retired teachers. If you have forgotten how your legislators voted, please review the June 2016 issue of the

Bulletin Board on the Indiana Retired Teachers Association's website, www.retiredteachers.org.

We have been informed that a legislative study group was formed this summer to review again the Defined Contribution plan for use in Indiana. Once this plan is initiated for the hiring of new teachers, it will be very easy to turn it into the default for all educators. This will eventually affect all retired educators' pensions as monies that would have gone into the teachers' retirement funds will no longer be propping up the fund for current retirees. Thus, pension funds for current members could be reduced.

Besides affecting all pension recipients, it is a shame to think that future educators will not have the security of a lifetime pension. The change will become just another move by the state legislature to privatize Indiana's educational system. What once was established by our Indiana forefathers as a free public education for all is quickly turning into a caste system of education for the rich and penitence for the middle and lower classes.

Two years ago I had a legislator tell me, "Well, if it (charter schools and vouchers) don't work out, we can always go back to the way it was." Wow, how could that ever be? Generations of young people will have lost out on a quality education, qualified teachers will no longer be available, and our educational system will require years, if not decades, to recover. How can we go back when there will be none to show the way?

Unfortunately, these ideas of eliminating pensions and privatizing education are not ideas originating in Indiana. The ideas can be found occurring in many states across the nation. They originate from the agenda of The American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC). Go to your computer and "Google" information about the Council. It is extremely disturbing. Unfortunately, many of Indiana's legislators are strong supporters of ALEC. The Indiana Education Reform Package

created in 2011 is the model legislative policy promoted by ALEC for national use. As a proud Hoosier, I think it is time to elect politicians who will think for themselves and not be swayed by the money and rhetoric from an outside political machine.

We have the opportunity this November to make a statement to our state and national leadership. Make sure you exercise that right this fall and support public education.

Executive Director's Message



As summer slips away we have been very active and busy at IRTA. We are right in the middle of our membership drive, just finished our summer committee meetings, attending the legislative summer study committee meetings on pensions and the Indiana Pension Retirement System board meetings, and preparing for our Fall Workshops.

Your IRTA continues to be your watchdog on legislative action against your pensions and we attend all the Indiana Retirement Pension Retirement System board meetings to find out information that may directly affect retired educators now and in the future. The war on public pensions and the pressure to privatize governmental services and pensions is very real in Indiana and across the nation. Dennis's letter spells out the issues and problems we continue to battle at the state level.

A new area of concern that came forward in July was Governor Pence's Plan for Hoosier Innovation and Entrepreneurship. Part of the plan was a request from the Governor to have INPRS invest up to \$500 million dollars in early-stage and mid-market Indiana companies. Red flags immediately arose. I spoke the next day with Steve Russo, executive director for INPRS, about this announcement. Here are the findings that Steve shared with me in our conversation and this was again shared with the Legislative Pension and Oversight Committee Meeting in late August:

Candidate Responses to Pension Questionaire

We sent a questionnaire to the two leading candidates for governor in mid-August pertaining to public pensions and compensation issues that we felt were important to you as retired educators. At the time of this newsletter being sent to the publisher we had no responses from Lt. Governor Eric Holcomb. We called to remind his office and offered a 4 day extension from our first deadline in which to respond. If we receive information from the Lt. Governor in the near future, we will publish and place it on our website once we receive it.

The following responses in italics are from, John Gregg, the Democratic candidate for governor:

- 1) Do you believe retired educators should receive a Cost of Living increase and a "13th Check" each year? Yes and I am proud to say that throughout my time in the state legislature I always voted for the "13th Check." That support will continue as Governor.
- 2) Do you believe retired educators have earned the right to retire with independence and dignity? If so, what it the best method to achieve it?

Yes. Education is a selfless profession, one that requires a passion and dedication to others. After years of service, educators should be celebrated for their hard work. Before retirement, we must make sure educators are earning good wages – one that makes raising a family affordable and less-burdensome on pocketbooks. We must also protect the retirement funds of teachers and all public employees from privatization of any kind. (I voted for the 'Rule of 85' when it passed in 1989).

3) Would you consider increasing the amount of the "13th Check" or stipend, since it has never been increased since its inception? If so, how much increase would you support? Do you believe increasing the amount each year?

I would support this and would be willing to work with the members of the General Assembly, your organization and other stakeholders to arrive at an appropriate number.

4) Are you going to advocate, or support, the Defined Contribution retirement plan over the Defined Benefit Plan for new education hires?

As I always have, I will advocate for and support the Defined Benefit Retirement Plan (Pensions) for existing and new teachers. I will protect teacher pensions from privatization or other attempts to weaken them. Pensions are a great recruitment tool, they provide for reliable income in retirement and they work. State government should not mettle in something that is working and solvent.

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

- INPRS is an independent body by statute and has a fiduciary duty solely to its members within statutory and regulatory constraints. (Meaning any decisions by the INPRS board that is not in the best interest of its members would be illegal and punishable by law.)
- Decisions to establish additional funds to support the Governor's plan are at the sole discretion of INPRS and will be done in accordance to their fiduciary duty. INPRS will maintain all oversight and due diligence to ensure investments are made in the best interests of its members. (Just like they do for all their investments)
- Any company invested in would be vetted like any other investment that INPRS makes and they use independent financial professionals for their investments advice.
- Since 2002, INPRS has prudently achieved a 7.2% annualized return on 350 million dollars of commitments to Indiana-focused privately owned companies and funds.
- Investment gains will go directly into the INPRS retirement funds

After our conversation I felt the retirement funds were secure with INPRS's investment policies and guidelines. I do not like the idea of legislators using the retirement fund as an investment tool for pet projects, or political gain, as it sets a poor precedent. I received a letter back from Governor Pence's office late in August explaining where he was going to direct the budget reserves from this past fiscal year. This year's reserves were going to help fund improvements on our roads and bridges which is not a surprise. Thank you to those that wrote Governor Pence requesting that he place the additional funds in the Pension Stabilization Fund

The first Legislative Pension Management Oversight Committee Meeting this summer had these topics brought forward and will be further discussed during the upcoming meetings and during the legislative session in January. The topics: Cost of Living Increase, 13th Check increase, along with the Defined Benefit and Defined Contribution debate for new teacher hires.

You will find in this newsletter questions that were sent to the two leading candidates for governor. As I write this letter only Candidate Gregg has responded. We hope that Lt. Governor Holcomb will respond so we know his thoughts about our pension issues.


