[An Egyptian Warrior Goddess]

Where to Find It: First Floor, Egyptian Gallery 1 Mellon Curatorial Fellow: Sarah M. Schellinger

Who is this?

Sekhmet, whose name means "she who is powerful," is a warrior goddess who led the pharaohs into battle. Sekhmet is the consort of the creator god, Ptah, and the mother of the god Nefertum, patron of the cosmetic and healing arts of flowers. This triad, or family group, was worshipped in Memphis—over 700 statues of Sekhmet were made in the New Kingdom during the reign of Amenhotep III (ca. 1390–1352 BC).

..... What's missing here?

Damage to this statue has taken Sekhmet's symbolic crown: a sun-disc with a uraeus serpent, which associates her with the Eye of Ra. To see what it would have looked like, check out the bronze statuette in the case by the gallery's entrance.

What myth is she most known for?

Thousands of years ago when the sun god Ra ruled, he asked his daughter Sekhmet to destroy those who defied him. But once she started killing, her bloodlust only grew. Ra stepped in to calm her just before she destroyed all mankind—whew!

What do these hieroglyphics say?

Left: Good god, Lord of the Two Lands, Neb-Ma'at-Ra (Amenhotep III), Beloved of Sekhmet, Lady of Aaget (a place or estate in Egypt), given life forever.

Right: Son of Ra, his beloved, Amenhotep, Ruler of Thebes (Waset), Beloved of Sekhmet, Lady of Aaget, given life forever.

Why does she look like that? Sekhmet is represented with the head of a lioness, the fiercest hunter in the Egyptian world. Ancient Egyptians believed the animal world possessed mysterious qualities and associated

certain animals with particular gods and goddesses.

AFTER MORE THAN TWO CENTURIES of displacement, dispossession, and marginalization, indigenous Australians are reviving their cultures, not least through the work of contemporary artists.

Early iconography, methods, and themes suffuse a collection of over one hundred objects created by Aboriginal artists since the mid-1990s, recently given to the Museum by May and Victor Lam and family. *Of Country and Culture* celebrates that gift—and the flourishing of Aboriginal art in recent decades.

When *Spirit Country*, an exhibition of the Gantner Myer collection of Aboriginal art, traveled to the Museum in 2000, longtime Trustee May Lam was so moved that she and her daughter Dorothy traveled to Australia. "They visited Aboriginal communities across the continent and amassed this outstanding collection," said Director Katie Luber. "We are so honored that it will now be a permanent benefit to our community."

The oldest surviving examples of Aboriginal rock art are more than 50,000 years old, and body and sand paintings have played a central role in ceremonies for generations. These works by contemporary Aboriginal artists are informed by designs and subjects depicted by their ancestors—and innovative approaches to material and form.

In Of Country and Culture traditional sand paintings inspire Alma Nungarrayi Granites' acrylic abstractions: layers of dots, forms, and colors vibrate with the rhythm and intensity of ceremonial song and dance. Seymour Wulida's application of body paint designs onto eucalyptus bark allows the tree's vertical form to become a stand-in for the body. Tess Tipungwuti's Bima (right) conveys cultural losses through evocation of the pukumani (funerary) traditions of the Tiwi Islands, in which sculptures are placed by the graves of loved ones and left to the elements.

"Ancient as the roots of this work may be, the artists address many of the same concerns as their international contemporaries, such as identity, materiality, and abstraction," said Lana Meador, Curatorial Assistant and co-curator of the exhibition with Erin Murphy, Manager of Exhibitions and Assistant to the Chief Curator. "The collection is also notable in representing so many Aboriginal women artists and subjects related to women's ceremonies."

The exhibition presents a wide range of materials and regional styles. Organized thematically, the works explore the concepts of ancestral legacy, the land, ceremony, and mortality, and reveal the diversity of Aboriginal artistic traditions.



Deep In the Art of Texas





"Julian Onderdonk's work still influences the way visitors revere—and artists paint—the Texas landscape," said William Keyse Rudolph, PhD, the Marie and Hugh Halff Curator of American Art and Mellon Chief Curator. "It is exciting to share these works—many from private collections—with our visitors."

The San Antonio native and American impressionist is best known for his signature bluebonnets and depictions of the Texas countryside. However, he spent his formative years training in New York under American artist William Merritt Chase (a fine example of Chase's work is represented in the Museum's collection, Mrs. Chase and Child, ca. 1889). It is only after returning to Texas in 1909 that Onderdonk portrayed the distinctive surroundings of his state at different times of day and became admired by collectors.

Julian Onderdonk and the Texan Landscape presents a select group of more than twenty-five of the artist's paintings, from views of the Long Island landscape to sweeping impressions of the varied Texas terrain.

The exhibition was organized by the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, and coincides with the publication of Julian Onderdonk: A Catalogue Raisonné by Harry A. Halff and Elizabeth Halff, who spent twenty years tracking down the works.

Say My Name



"I'VE NURTURED THE IDEA of this exhibition for a very long time," said Emily Sano, PhD, the Coates-Cowden-Brown Senior Advisor for Asian Art. "My interest in Pure Land Buddhism began when I was a graduate student visiting important temples in Japan. I saw magnificent works of art—golden Buddhas and colorful paintings—many that had survived centuries.'

Heaven and Hell: Salvation and Retribution in Pure Land Buddhism explores depictions of the afterlife in Buddhist art through a major exhibition that brings together approximately seventy-five paintings, sculptures, and works of decorative art. Pure Land Buddhism holds that Amitabha, the Buddha of the Western Paradise, promises salvation in his heavenly paradise after death to anyone who simply calls his name.

The appeal of easy salvation made faith in Amitabha one of the most popular forms of Buddhism throughout Asia. The art reflects the deep passions stirred by contrasting depictions of hell with the promise of paradise. The exhibition emphasizes works from Japan, where Pure Land belief achieved its highest refinement, but also presents works from India, Southeast Asia, China, Tibet, and Korea. Heaven and Hell shows the endurance of Pure Land motifs across continents for more than a thousand years.

In addition to several works from the San Antonio Museum of Art, the show includes pieces from fifteen other collections, including the Minneapolis Institute of Art; the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; the Metropolitan Museum of Art; the Cleveland Art Museum; the Dallas Museum of Art; and the Asian Art Museum of San Francisco.

Golden Boy

THE STORY BEGINS in the summer of 2011. Michelle Bushey, PhD, then a chemistry professor at Trinity University, asked if she could use her department's newly acquired XRF (x-ray fluorescence) instrument to analyze a work of art in the Museum's collection. This led to the unexpected discovery of gilding on the ancient portrait of Emperor Hadrian's youthful lover, Antinous.

"This is the first project of its kind for the Museum," said Jessica Powers, PhD, the Gilbert M. Denman Jr. Curator of Art of the Ancient Mediterranean World. "The exhibition Antinous focuses on the insights we discovered through close scientific examination of a single work in our collection."

Although Roman marble statues in museums typically appear white, they were in most cases colorfully painted and sometimes gilded. Further examination of the Museum's Antinous with Dr. Mark Abbe, professor of art history at the University of Georgia, revealed that purple stains on the marble surface were actually caused by the deterioration of ancient gilding. "This phenomenon has been recorded on only a very few Roman statues," said Powers, "and its documentation on the Museum's Antinous marks an important contribution to the understanding of gilding and polychromy on Roman sculptures.'





Following Antinous' death by drowning in the Nile in AD 130, Hadrian mourned him elaborately, deifying the youth, naming a city in Egypt after him, and commissioning numerous posthumous portraits. The worship of Antinous spread throughout the eastern provinces of the Roman Empire, and his image appeared in sculpture and on coins and gems. The Museum's marble head once belonged to a larger-than-life-sized statue. Antinous, the Emperor's Beloved will tell the story of Antinous and present a behind-the-scenes look at what science can reveal about art history.

The exhibition features works from the Museum's collection as well as loans from the J. Paul Getty Museum, the American Numismatic Society, and the University of Pennsylvania Museum of Archaeology.

On the Curator's Shelf

EMILY SANO, the Coates-Cowden-Brown Senior Advisor for Asian Art, shares a few of her prized possessions.



THE TROPHY AT LEFT-my "Oscar"-makes me smile. When I began work at San Francisco's Asian Art Museum, which was being ambitiously moved from Golden Gate Park to downtown, we had only a year to produce a major traveling exhibition. I took two curators, flew to China, and organized a show of Xian warriors. It was such a great success that my staff surprised me with this "Xian Oscar." My good friend Hung Liu made the print, based on a photograph. Sent to the countryside during China's Cultural Revolution, she managed to bring paints and do her own work during her "reeducation." I bought the blue and white ceramics-vessels for red ink used in seals-on my first trip to China in the '80s, before it was well travelled by Westerners. The ceramic pencils came from the lively mind of artist Diane Levinson. She often brought her students to the Asian Art Museum. where we became friends. The medal in the box is called the Order of the Rising Sun, Golden Rays, and Neck Ribbon. It was given to me in 2008 by the Japanese government for promoting Japanese art and culture in America. It was such an honor. To the right of the medal, the Negoro ware Japanese lunch box was a gift from a lacquer specialist. It has compartments for rice, pickles and

vegetables and comes in a cloth carrying-bag decorated with the tiny stitching done in farmhouses. As a student in Japan, I visited an ancient, still-active kiln and bought my first Bizen ware: a beautiful sake bottle. The potter and his father made supper and let me sleep in a tiny tatami room filled with ceramics. The next morning he said, "You've slept with my pots, so now you must take one. Pay what you can, when you can." Its box is lovely, too, made so that unwrapping the object becomes almost ceremonial, showing reverence for the work and the culture it represents. Fukami is a ceramicist famous for the delicacy of his shapes, his robin's-egg-blue glaze, and his perfectionism. He made the porcelain sculpture. It's said that working with porcelain is like trying to throw ice cream, so his subtlety amazes me. The skateboard fellow was made by my friend Wanxin Zhang. He, too, grew up during the Cultural Revolution, and once he could travel, went to see the Terracotta Army in Xian. He was so impressed by the discovery that he's made a whole series of these warriors in very amusing forms. To the far right is a small ceramic 12th-century Buddha I found in an antique store in London. These plaques were bought in temples and carried by travelers. I've long studied Buddhism, so this piece is precious to me.



Emily Sano joined the staff of the Museum in January 2016 as the Coates-Cowden-Brown Senior Advisor for Asian Art. Previously, Dr. Sano served as Director of the Asian Art Museum of San Francisco; Deputy Director and Chief Curator of Non-Western Art at the Dallas Museum of Art; and Curator of Asian Art at the Kimbell Art Museum in Fort Worth.

Lady Arundell Gets Makeover in Houston

Lady Arundell by Sir Joshua Reynolds, one of the jewels in the Museum's European collection, is in Houston for a year's restoration. Over the past 248 years, the lady has lost her bloom, having suffered from previous restorations, over-cleaning, and a loss of pigment in her face, David Bomford, Chief Curator of European Art and Chair of the Department of Conservation at the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, and his wife Zahira Bamford, MFAH's Senior Painting Conservator, will restore Lady Arundell to her original beauty and return the luster to her garments and drapery. The Bomfords specialize in the work of Reynolds, the famed eighteenth-century British portraitist who captured a majority of England's aristocracy in lavish, ceremonial attire.

6 Questions for... PAM HANNAH. Chief Operations Officer

What did you want to be when you grew up? I didn't dream of any specific career—I just wanted to see the world.

How did you become involved with museums, specifically leading museum construction and renovation?

I started out as a traffic engineer and transportation planner in Los Angeles. By accident, I stumbled upon a volunteer opportunity at the Southwest Museum of the American Indian, where the staff was desperate for help. I spent every spare moment there, researching and writing grants, writing press releases, building and installing exhibits, and running lectures. When the museum had a chance to open a satellite gallery at Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the director offered me a position to help raise funds: hire designers, architects, and contractors; design and develop a store; run the satellite for two years; then oversee the repair of the original museum—a historic 1912 Mission Revival building, damaged in the 1994 Northridge Earthquake. It sounded like a crazy jump, but turned out to be one of the most rewarding experiences of my life.

What is the biggest challenge you've faced during the

Our current renovation and construction projects—totaling over \$9M—have quite a few moving parts! Although construction of the central utility plant is rather straightforward, renovating the first-floor restrooms, auditorium, and HVAC system next to, or inside, galleries is a real challenge. In the coming six months, we'll take a few galleries off view in order to secure art and artifacts. Please forgive temporary disruptions!

What is the best way to experience a museum?

Let the art speak to you and guide you—just wander! But given my job, I tend to make two rounds. First, I meander where the art leads me. Then I cover every square inch to photograph each detail that supports that experience: wayfinding signs, wall finishes, benches, air supply grills, lighting, exhibit wall systems, labels, flooring, ceilings, elevators, stores, cafés, visitor services desks, coat checks, restrooms, staff uniforms, badges, trash cans, etc. I'm interested in everything that makes a museum well rounded, and I learn from our sister institutions.

Where do you find inspiration?

In the elegance of thoughtful design. The art nouveau and arts and crafts movements, which draw inspiration from nature, are my favorites. I'm very drawn to the Islamic collection here, for similar reasons.

What museum inspires you the most?

I've a soft spot for the Musée d'Orsay in Paris, which features what I cherish most: brilliant reuse of a historic building; a collection that leaves me speechless; plenty of benches for people-watching; a store that reflects the collection; and a dramatic café space with wonderful food and wine. The only thing missing is an outdoor art space and landscaped garden; but then, the Seine and the Tuileries gardens are right outside the front door. Another great museum on the river!

Pamela Hannah earned her BS in Civil Engineering from Purdue University. After working as a traffic engineer for the city of Los Angeles, she served in outreach. programs, and operations at L.A.'s Autry National Center/Southwest Museum of the American Indian. She headed operations at San Antonio's Briscoe Western Art Museum and the DoSeum before joining the Museum as Chief Operations Officer.

At Botika chef Geronimo Lopez reveals the layering of three culinary traditions in Peru: traditional pre-Hispanic Andean Criollo cuisine and the Nikkei and Chipa influences from 19th-century Japanese and Cantonese immigrants. The Caracas-born chef grew up immersed in this mix of cultures and ingredients as Asian migration spread throughout Latin America. "For me, Chinese food tasted like home," he said. After stints at the Four Seasons in Hawaii. Mexico. and Caracas. Lopez came to San Antonio four years ago to run NAO, the restaurant at the Culinary Institute of America. Now his expertise shines through at Botika in tiraditos (spicy sauced sashimi), ceviches, empanadas, superb sushi, and Chinese noodle and fried rice dishes enlivened by Latin American ingredients. As to Geronimo's name: "My father was an anthropologist who admired the great Apache war chief. Isn't it curious that I get to do what I love just a few blocks from where he was confined at Fort Sam Houston in 1886?

(There are actually three routes that interconnect so check the website for details). A day pass is just \$2.75—well worth the relaxing ride and not having to think about driving and parking.

Jason Dady has rebooted Bin 555 at Artisan Alley in a cozy bungalow on Grayson Street (where Bakery Lorraine got its start and across from his Shuck Shack). Serial nibblers and socializers can while away the evening over savory small plates of Barcelona-style tapas such as Serrano-wrapped blue cheese dates, octopus with olive oil and smoked paprika, or a sampler of Spanish cheeses and chorizo. Friendly patrons suggest favorite dishes and drinks as they wait to order at the bar and often continue to chat across tables once seated inside or in the fire-pit-warmed back garden. Choose from a good selection of Spanish wines; classic caipirinhas, mojitos, and negronis: or craft gin and tonic cocktails—the "José Andres," which includes grapefruit, rosemary, and juniper berries, comes highly recommended.

At least seventeen different species of prickly pear cactus proliferate in Texas—and have been used for food, healing, water purification, pouches, and cooking vessels for centuries. Now one man is making vodka from our official state plant. "Vodka has always been distilled from abundant or surplus regional crops like potatoes or grain that might otherwise rot in the field," says Nick Spink of Artisan on Alamo. "We happen to have a lot of prickly pear." Spink harvests prickly pear pads on local ranches; makes a mash (skins, thorns, and all); ferments, skims, and distills it; then bottles and labels by hand what turns out to be a subtle, aromatic vodka called Spike. (The name commemorates his inevitable run-ins with the cactus). It's sold in liquor stores, but it's more fun to enjoy it in seasonal craft cocktails at Spink's quirky distillery bar, which has a DIY late-'80s feel with paintings by Spink and a rotation of other artists. Not into cactus? He also makes Texas Pride, a fine vodka from local corn.

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


