Infant 1

We learn a lot about ourselves based on our natural curiosity. We want to know why certain things are happening and what exactly is happening. And, infants are prime for feeling a sense of wonder. They play with their feet and hands and they kick and move their legs, all in an attempt to learn about their body. They also get to see other people's bodies and how they move and use their bodies. All of that is found under the "Towards A Better World" aspect of our curriculum. Under the "Sense of Self" portion, we can learn to recognize ourselves and our body parts, we can identify ourselves in photos or in the mirror and we can develop a sense of self as separate from others. We can do this by looking at photos of ourselves, playing recall games (such as "where are your toes?"), and having consistent and regular routines.

Introducing the Music Makers Program

In 2018, the Education and Development team at Bright Horizons introduced Music Makers, the musical component of Art Smart, Bright Horizons' visual and performing arts curriculum. At Bright Horizons, we believe that music exposure is an important part of every child's development.

Music is much more than singing. Music matters because it is universal. Every culture has some form of music, and it naturally interests and delights children. Music has a language of its own and is a wonderful outlet for creative energy. Music builds relationships, nurtures developmental skills, and encourages cultural exchanges. Howard Gardner, developer of the concept of multiple intelligences, considers music one of the eight intelligences.

Music Makers offers teachers practical and theoretical information about the value of music and how to present it in the early childhood classroom.

A dynamic music program will:

- ▶ Teach children the basic properties of music, such as tempo, pitch, and volume.
- ▶ Build children's self-esteem and ability to express feelings.
- Support peer interaction and social skills knowledge.
- Develop language and vocabulary.
- Expose children to cultures and languages.
- Introduce children to musical instruments.

In your child's classroom, you might see:

- Sound areas in the infant and toddler rooms that include musical instruments, wind chimes, or whistles.
- Musical instruments, songbooks, microphones, and other materials as appropriate for each age group.
- Explorations of musicians, composers, and musical groups, such as orchestras and quartets.
- Children singing songs, dancing, playing instruments, creating instruments, or reading books related to music.
- Children exploring patterns, rhythms, and tones.

Introduce children to musical instruments. The Music Makers curriculum is just one way we keep our promises to nurture and care for the whole child and create joyful places for childhood. Talk with your child's teacher or director to learn more about Music Makers.

Did You Know?

The Partnership for a Healthier America (PHA) works with private companies to eliminate the problem of childhood obesity, and complements the Let's Move! initiative started by former First Lady Michelle Obama. In 2011, Bright Horizons was the first early care organization to join PHA and in 2017 we renewed our commitment until 2020.
