# Parent-Teacher Conferences

### **Open House**

The general public has been invited through the Bright Horizons' websites to visit the center to see the curriculum in action. April 16 through 19, Tuesday through Friday, visitors will be allowed to drop in to tour the preschool classrooms and ask questions about the activities teachers do with the preschool children. If you have friends or neighbors who might be interested in enrolling for the Fall of 2019, there should be openings for children who are 3, 4 or 5 and fully potty-trained. Once the kindergarteners go off to school and the younger children move into North, East and West we expect to have some spaces available. The Open House hours are from 9 to 11 a.m. and 2 to 5 p.m. so as not to interrupt lunch and nap for our children.











## **Problem Solving: From Infancy to Preschool**

Kids and adults alike face a variety of problems everyday. Those problems range from social issues such as, "she doesn't want to be my friend," to other cognitive problems like, "I can't find my keys," or "this math equation is too hard." No matter what the problem is, the hope is that all people, young and old, have the skills necessary to solve whatever challenges come their way.

Everyday, the staff at Clever Kids is working diligently to ensure that infants, toddlers, and preschoolers have opportunities to practice problem solving. Unfortunately, that sometimes means we have to allow children to fail. That sounds rather harsh when it is said like that but it's the truth.

For example, when an infant is learning to walk we allow them to fall down, in a safe way of course! The problem for the infant in the top picture is learning to walk. Walking requires a lot of balance and coordination and if we catch babies every time they begin to fall, they don't learn their limits. So in reality, children learn to walk and they learn it by failing many times over and over!

Here is an example of a teacher offering a toddler support with a cognitive problem. Carter wanted to put the side onto the wagon, but couldn't figure out why it wouldn't fit. When he got frustrated he stopped and tried handing it to Ms. Nicole. "Help, can't do it Ms. Nicole," "Carter you can do it, why don't you try to turn it around?" Carter did and he was able to fix it. He immediately got a huge smile on his face and pushed the wagon around, looking proud.

The following toddler social problem was simply solved by an interest in other things but not before the teacher tried modeling some language that could have been used. Isla was playing on the bike outside, she got frustrated when she couldn't get into the house. Ida came over pushing it. Isla thought that Ida was taking it and started screaming and crying. Ms. Nicole walked over and told Isla, "Ida doesn't understand why you are screaming. Try saying, "mine," Ida got bored and decided to walk away. Isla was happy and went along with trying to get the bike into the house.

Teachers and caregivers play a big role in helping children learn to be successful problem solvers. Whether they are modeling appropriate language, giving them tools and techniques to help move things along, being a cheerleader when things get exciting, or a referee when things get a little rocky. Regardless of how we get there, we know we have done our job well when we see a couple of preschoolers solving a complex problem all on their own. Here is one of those instances: the two boys in the last two pictures were playing with some pine needles. The pine needles got stuck on the top of the tent. One boy said, "Ah man, our pine needles got stuck we need to get a ladder." The other boy said, "but we don't have a ladder. I know, we can throw a ball and hit it off of the top." "Yeah that's a great idea!" So, they tried throwing it on the top. When they discovered that didn't work, they figured out they can throw the ball under the tent and knock it off. When they were successful they continued to do it as a game. It was really fun to watch and fantastic to know that the children in our care have learned to be successful problem solvers and they learned it by having supportive teachers and caregivers who give just the right amount of support!

## It's all in the Family! Activities to Build Memories


Enjoying family activities is a precious gift to give our children and ourselves. Time with people we love fosters feelings of belonging and intimacy, builds trust, instills a sense of security, and creates lifelong memories. Below are fun, inexpensive activities for all ages:

- ▶ Gaze at stars: Explain to children that stars form patterns that we call constellations and then research them online and in books. Go outside on a clear evening and try to identify constellations or have fun making up your own. Draw the formations on paper or lay them out using pipe cleaners and small rocks. With younger children, focus on the shape of the moon.
- ▶ **Visit farmers markets:** An excursion to a farmers market provides an opportunity to smell the scents of fresh produce, enjoy tasty samples of nutritious foods, hear local musicians playing music, and participate in the coming together of the community.
- ▶ Go for a hike or walk: Hiking or walking connects family members to nature, as well as each other. On walks, you might take photographs, collect special rocks, leaves, and sticks, or just enjoy the world's natural wonders and time with each other.
- ▶ Institute a family fitness program: This could include age/stage-appropriate push-ups, sit-ups, stretching, walking, hopping, skipping, jumping, or jogging. Family members might keep a fitness log, use a pedometer to count steps, or count your heartbeats before and after exercise.
- ▶ **Volunteer:** Have you considered making volunteering part of your family culture? Adults inspire empathy and compassion by volunteering as a family at a soup kitchen, nursing home, homeless shelter, or other local organizations. For activity suggestions browse sites such as Doing Good Together: doinggoodtogether.org.
- ▶ Build a cozy fort: You might use branches and wood, blankets and chairs, or a giant carton (from an appliance store), to design a cozy den. After you build this comfy place to congregate, your family can cuddle up to read, snack, tell stories, or play games.

All the activities above enhance relationships because family members enjoy simple activities, share rewarding adventures, and make memories.
