Yellow Room

Social interactions in our twos classroom are fun and playful, but there is so much intention in what is happening in every moment as teachers facilitate conversation and interactions that help children to express their feelings and emotions in acceptable ways. For twos, children are mostly concerned about their own needs and do not usually understand how others might feel if it is different from their own feelings- but with modeling, this can look much different. As we see children at this age imitating mannerisms and activities that they see others doing, you will often here them using phrases to acknowledge their peers that they hear from their teachers. Children begin to build on beginning stages of empathy through role-play and basic conversation skills.

Blue Room

Caring Matters is a component of our curriculum that is implemented daily in all of our classrooms. For our preschoolers this is evident when they role-play, when they socially engage with others, and recognize their feelings and needs, and when they express their own feelings and emotions. A child may use a doll to role-play, and comfort the doll through using language like, "It's okay, don't be sad. I'll take care of you." In the next moment, we may see that same child comforting a peer who is sad because they are missing their parent and utilizing some of the same language they were just experimenting with in their play. When children can recognize they are individuals who have their own thoughts, feelings, and ideas and that others are also individuals- they become more aware of the world around them and begin to consider possible solutions that not only help themselves, but also others.

Orange Room

Our K-Prep Room has been spending some of their center time in the outdoor space. It's clear that by giving the children a new setting for this to happen in, they are exploring activities and opportunities in a different light. Children explore math concepts through tracing one another's bodies and comparing and measuring size. They are engaging in art that is influenced by the sound of birds and the beauty of trees, and they are creating garden plant labels and exploring the science of plants we have growing in the garden. The Praying Mantis that we discovered camouflaged in the lettuce not only provides more opportunity for science, but also an appreciation for living creatures. Children begin to appreciate and understand that learning can happen everywhere!

Outdoors

Did you know that our Movement Matters Zone not only builds on physical development, but also benefits emotional development? When children are outdoors, they are utilizing almost all of their senses. They are aware of their surroundings through not only sight and sound, but they also can explore textures with touch, and the sense of familiar and new smells. Children experiment with new physical tasks and build a sense of independence as they continue to try, and eventually find success with something new. They utilize problem-solving skills, take reasonable risk, show persistence, and take pride in trying and succeeding with new accomplishments.

Encouraging Gratitude in Children

"Encouraging an attitude of gratitude in your child is important not only because we want to raise generous and gracious children, but also because having a thankful mindset has positive emotional and physical outcomes. Being grateful is a skill you and your child can practice together each day."

- Talk about what you liked best about your day. At dinner, ask each family member to share something about their day that they are grateful for.
- Create a gratitude jar. Ask your child to write down or draw different people/events they feel grateful for and add them to a jar. When your child is having a tough day, read aloud some of your family's past grateful moments.
- Model gratitude. How you react to your child's acts of kindness impacts development around gratitude. Let your child see you thanking others, too, such as the cashier at the grocery store.
