The ReOrient Festival started out as Six Plays en Short in 1999 at Exit Stage Left. In 2000, we came up with the title ReOrient. It was inspired by Salman Rushdie's novel, The Ground Beneath Her Feet, where he describes the world as being in a disoriented state. Dis-Oriented, because we have lost our east. And to find our way (back) we need to find our east, again. Today, ten years later, we continue to search for our East in the ReOrient Festival. Questions of home, identity, agency

and longing loom largely in the festival. The collection of nine plays selected for this year's retrospective, showcase diverse artistic range both in writing and directing style. The fact that they remain relevant even years after they were first produced is a testament to the timelessness of the arts and the reality of world politics.

This year, we begin our journey in Afghanistan with Naomi Wallace's sublime No Such Cold Thing. This is Bella Warda's ReOrient directorial debut. Last seen in A Girl's War in January, Bella is more familiar to Golden Thread audiences as a performer. Another ReOrient regular, Yussef El Guindi has three plays in this year's festival including A Marriage Proposal expertly directed by his old Carnegie Mellon buddy, Hafiz Karmali., who also directs Yussef's new internet play, The Review, to be performed interactively in Cairo and San Francisco via the internet and presented at ReOrient Forum. Do not miss this unprecedented event. It is a special treat to bring back Vida Ghahremani in Abaga, her first Golden Thread performance, and to partner her with such a talented cast. Another welcome return is that of Motti Lerner and his extraordinary play, Coming Home. Both Motti and Hafiz will participate in ReOrient Forum and lead workshops in playwriting and directing, respectively. Mark Routhier who delighted audiences with Jihad Jones and Kalashnikov Babes last summer is back to direct Coming Home and Kevin Doyle's Compression of a Casualty which touches on the media's treatment of the Iraq War. Betty Shamieh's poetic piece, Tamam, and El Guindi's acerbic comedy, The Monologist Suffers Her Monologue, present a Palestinian woman's perspective but in entirely different styles. An Iranian woman's perspective is at the center of the sexy comedy, Call Me Mehdi and in I'm Not a Serial Killer, Caveh Zahedi takes a "stab" at crosscultural relationships, with mixed results!

Tonight's program would not have been possible without the dedication of the artists, designers and production staff who worked tirelessly to bring you these amazing plays. In particular, I would like to thank Navid Ghaem Maghami, Blake Manship and Alycia Dymond for their heroic efforts. The festival ensemble is a dream cast and a microcosm of the United Nations. But unlike the UN, ReOrient actors get along splendidly. Maybe it's because they are in theatre and not politics. Or maybe it's because we don't have a Security Council.

Speaking of Security...please keep Golden Thread in your hearts and minds as you make your year-end giving. Without your continued support, we would not be able to do this important work. There is no amount too small but timing is critical and now is the time to make a difference by making a donation.

Here is to many more festivals and our continued ReOrientation!

Time and Place: 1915, Constantinople, 1935-36, Jerusalem

Historical Background: On April 24, 1915 a significant number of Armenian artists and intellectuals were arrested and later executed by the Turkish authorities under the leadership of the Young Turks. This day has come to symbolize the near annihilation of the Armenian people at the hand of the Turkish government, first under the Ottoman Empire and later the Young Turks, in the late 19th century and early 20th. Very few survived the massacre and forced migration. Many of the survivors walked to Syria from Turkey. The Armenian refugees settled throughout the Middle East, Europe and America. In the same era, Jewish villages in Russia, later the Soviet Union, were systematically evacuated under The Pogrom. The wave of Jewish migration to Palestine intensified in the 1920's and 30's. In 1929, a major clash took place between the Arabs and the Jews in Palestine at the Wailing Wall in Jerusalem, followed by the Arab Revolt in 1936-39.

The British government issued the Balfour Declaration in 1917, which was adopted by The League of Nations in 1923. It lent support to the establishment of a Jewish state in Palestine provided that Jews and the existing non-Jewish communities would enjoy the same religious freedom and political rights. As the persecution of Jews in Germany (and other European nations) escalated, the number of Jewish immigrants increased in Palestine and the hostilities grew between Arabs and Jews.

On November 12, 1947, the United Nations adopted Assembly Resolution 181. It recommended the establishment of two sovereign states joined in an economic federation with Jerusalem having a separate status as an international city under UN administration. On May 14, 1948, David Ben-Gurion, head of the Jewish Agency, formally proclaimed the establishment of Israel as an independent state. On May 15th, 1948, the bordering Arab states sent contingents of their armies into Palestine as the last British forces departed. (T. Yeghiazarian)

Compression of a Casualty was written with found material as its direct inspiration. The dialogue of the two news anchors is taken directly from official CNN transcripts of the morning of July 18, 2003. I witnessed the original broadcast live on television. The inspiration for Private Bertoldie's dialogue is taken from accounts in local Missouri newspapers which appeared in the days and weeks after Bertoldie's death. Nothing beyond the initial report depicted in this play was broadcast about Bertoldie by CNN that morning. This play is dedicated to the Bertoldie family.

Compression of a Casualty was part of a sustained interest by Mr. Doyle in the causes and affects of the Iraq War. His play W.M.D. (just the low points) was the recipient of a 2007 Performance Development Award from Chashama and The National Endowment for the Arts. Developed in collaboration with Sponsored By Nobody and the Iraqi actor Mokhallad Rasem, W.M.D. (just the low points) juxtaposed Americans' relationship to our media during wartime with the daily lives of everyday Iraqis. In 2010, Doyle will travel to Sweden to work on a film project about Iraqi refugees in the Stockholm suburb of Södertälje. Since the start of the Iraq War, Sweden has granted asylum to more Iraqis than any other Western nation. Iraqis now make up the largest ethnic group in Sweden, second only to Swedes and Finns. (K. Since then, Doyle has written and/or directed seven original plays, while working as a music video director in France, Sweden and New York City. In 2010, Doyle will be an Artist In Residence at Robert Wilson's Watermill Center (NY) and the Monty Arts Centre (Belgium) in support of his play ATM or this is [not] new york. He was recently accepted as a 2010 Resident Artist at the Mabou Mines/Suite Program in New York City.

Alycia Dymond (Production Manager) is a graduate of San Francisco State University, where she earned a degree in Technical Theatre. Our Enemies: Lively Scenes of Love and Combat, produced by Silk Road Theatre Project in Chicago, where it was Jeff Nominated, and was among the six finalists for the 2009 American Theater Critics Associations Steinberg/ New Play Award. The American Theater Critics Association has also given it the 2009 M. Elizabeth Osborn Award. Other productions: Back of the Throat was winner of the 2004 Northwest Playwrights' Competition held by Theater Schmeater. It won L.A. Weekly's Excellence in Playwriting Award for 2006. An avid traveler, Arlene has had the opportunity to direct and perform at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival and the Festival of Amathus in Cyprus. Directing credits include Les Miserables (authorized school edition); Lorca's The Billy-Club Puppets; Sylvia; Khamasseen (North American premiere); Prelude to a Kiss; Kiss Me, Kate; Something's Afoot; The Visit; Anouilh's Antigone; Macbeth; Man of La Mancha; Our Country's Good; The Real Inspector Hound and 1776.

Afif Houssain (Actor) is a Palestinian,



born in 1954. Afif was a high school teacher in Shefa-Amer, his home town in the Galilee, where he taught history of the Middle East for six years until the late-

1980's, when he moved to the United States. He has been attracted to theater since the early stages of his life, and was cast for rolls in a few local plays during his youth. In the U.S., he took several drama classes. These classes include a story-telling class and a playwriting class. Besides his passion for theater, he also enjoys writing.



Charles Isen* (Actor) After a 35 year hiatus, Charles returned to the theatre 3 years ago. As a young man in New York, he had the opportunity to study with Uta Hagen, Stella Adler. and Michael

Shurtleff. He has appeared in the Ross Valley Players productions of Our Town and Shadowlands. This season, he appeared in an episode of "Trauma" on NBC. He is thrilled to be participating with Golden Thread Productions, in a festival of plays with diverse casts that stimulate and provoke the audience to think.

Hafiz Karmali (Director) Most recently, to commemorate the Aga Khan's golden jubilee as spiritual leader, Hafiz directed an international touring theatre production, Ali to Karim – A Tribute to the Ismaili Imams. Hafiz has a special interest in cross-cultural performances with a view to showcasing indigenous performing arts of the Islamic world. With esoteric fables such as Attar's Conference of the Birds (Ismaili Centre, London) and the Ikhwan al-Safa's Island of Animals (Golden Thread Productions). Hafiz seeks to promote a better understanding of the arts and ideas of the Muslim world. After pursuing his MFA (Directing) at Carnegie-Mellon University School of Drama (where he first met playwright Yussef El-Guindi) Hafiz served an apprenticeship at the American Repertory Theatre where he assisted internationally renowned directors Robert Wilson and Andrei Serban, While at the A.R.T., he was a Teaching Fellow in the English Department at Harvard University for courses taught by Professor Robert Brustein. Directing credits include Azaan - A Call to Prayer (an Islamic opera in the making with performers from Tajikistan);

Rumi Vaudevilles x 7 (tales from the Mathnavi enacted by circus acrobats in Tashkent); Water for Life (Gujarat) and at UNESCO in Paris, Caravane de la Paix - French and Afghan poets calling for peace. Most notably, Hafiz helped set up Focus Humanitarian Assistance (affiliated with the Aga Khan Development Network) in Afghanistan in the wake of the Taliban invasion of Kabul (October 1996).

Vida Ghahremani (Actor) began acting



in film as a teenager in Iran where she established the standards of stardom. A member of the Screen Actors Guild, Vida continued her career in the US

appearing in plays by Pari Saberi and Masoud Assadolahi, and films such as Guests of Hotel Astoria and most recently, One Thousand Years of Good Prayers by Wayne Wang. Vida has been an Artistic Associate of Golden Thread Productions since its founding. She performed in Abaga in 2001 and Nine Armenians in 2002. Vida is an active member of Golden Thread's Fairytale Players and currently leads Creative Drama classes at Golestan School in Berkeley as part of Golden Thread's Education Program.

(Playwright) Motti Lerner playwright and screenwriter, born in Israel in 1949. Motti teaches playwriting at the Kibbutz College in Tel Aviv and has been active in the peace movement in Israel since 1973. He frequently lectures at European and American Universities on playwriting, on the Israeli theatre, and especially on the Israeli theatre and the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Most of his plays and films deal with political issues. He is a recipient of the Meskin Award for the best play (1985), and the Israeli Motion Picture Academy award for the best TV drama in 1995 and in 2004. In 1994 he won the Prime Minister's of Israel Award for his creative work. His plays have been produced in the US, the UK, Germany, Switzerland, Italy, Austria and Australia. His American productions include: The murder of Isaac at Centerstage Theatre, Baltimore, and also as part of the New York Now festival at the Public Theatre in NY), Exile in Jerusalem (Williamstown Festival - with Julie Harris in the title role. Jewish Ensemble Theatre. Detroit, La Mama Theatre, NY, Theatre J Washington DC) Hard Love - Theatre Or, Durham NC, Victory Gardens, Chicago, and JTS in Atlanta, Passing The Love of Women- Theatre J, Washington DC, Coming Home- Golden Thread Productions, San Francisco, Pangs of the Messiah - Theatre J in Washington DC, Silk Road Theatre Project in Chicago and Cleveland Playhouse in Cleveland. Benedictus for Golden Thread Productions in San Francisco, in LATC in Los Angeles, and in Theatre J in Washington DC. His play Pangs of the Messiah was nominated for the Helen Haves award for the best play of 2008.

Victoria Livingston-Hall (Costume Designer) received her B.A. in Industrial Design from California College of the Arts and her M.F.A. in Costume Design from the University of Califonia at Davis. She returned to the bay area after residing in West London.
