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LOS ANGELES PHILHARMONIC ASSOCIATION ANNOUNCES 2005/2006 SEASON

MUSIC DIRECTOR ESA-PEKKA SALONEN EXTENDS CONTRACT

Los Angeles (February 8, 2005) – Los Angeles Philharmonic Music Director Esa–Pekka Salonen, Board Chairman John Hotchkis, and President Deborah Borda, in addition to announcing the programming for the 2005/2006 season, also announced a two-year contract extension for Los Angeles Philharmonic Music Director Esa–Pekka Salonen, taking his commitment through the 2007/2008 season. This extension also includes an evergreen clause that goes into effect following that season, indicating both Salonen's and the Association's desire to continue the relationship beyond 2008. His current contract goes through the 2005/2006 season.

"I feel privileged to work for this incredibly exciting symphonic organization, where there is unlimited potential for invention," said Music Director Esa-Pekka Salonen. "We are witnessing a sociological phenomenon, a completely new music culture being born in Los Angeles. New and diverse audiences are flocking to Walt Disney Concert Hall. The high profile the orchestra has achieved puts us at the very center of the cultural community. There is no better or more exciting job I could be doing at this moment."

Board Chairman John Hotchkis comments on the extension, "The Board of Directors is truly thrilled that our highly esteemed Music Director Esa-Pekka Salonen will continue to provide his incredible musical leadership to our great orchestra and community. Our audience celebrates his decision and will continue to be inspired by his leadership and vision."

Philharmonic President Deborah Borda concurred, saying, "Along with the opening of Walt Disney Concert Hall, today's announcement marks a significant event in the life of the Los Angeles Philharmonic and our

musical community. The continuation of this synergistic partnership promises a rich artistic future where excellence, creativity and commitment can flourish together. It is, quite simply, great news; I couldn't be more delighted."

The 2005/2006 season is the Los Angeles Philharmonic's 87th subscription season and its third year in Walt Disney Concert Hall. The Philharmonic's winter season begins on September 29, 2005, and runs through June 4, 2006.

SEASON OVERVIEW

Special initiatives and focused series define the 2005/2006 season. Highlights include:

- *Minimalist Jukebox* John Adams directs a two-week festival in March and April, his own music, as well as works by Louis Andriessen, Philip Glass, Arvo Pärt, and Steve Reich.
- **Beethoven Unbound** Esa-Pekka Salonen provides new perspectives on the complete cycle of Beethoven's nine symphonies, which are programmed alongside works that he considers to be contemporary classics. Exploration also includes performances of a selection of Beethoven's string quartets performed by the Juilliard and Emerson Quartets.
- On Location residencies with Thomas Adès and Leif Ove Andsnes feature orchestral, Green Umbrella and chamber music programs, as well as master classes.
- The Art of the Guitar an exploration of the guitar in a variety of genres of music
- *El Niño* returns for concert-version performances for the first time at Walt Disney Concert Hall, with soprano Dawn Upshaw.
- Conclusion of five-year *Shostakovich Cycle*
- Mozart's 250th A Celebration in honor of Mozart's 250th birthday; Christoph von Dohnányi leads the Requiem.
- World Premieres of music by Adès, Hillborg, Lindberg and Reynolds, all commissioned or co-commissioned by the Los Angeles Philharmonic
- U.S. Premieres of works by Adès, Andriessen, Castiglioni, Chin and Salonen

MINIMALIST JUKEBOX

In the first major examination of the Minimalist movement by an American orchestra, the Los Angeles Philharmonic spends two weeks in March and April exploring the works of John Adams, Louis Andriessen, Philip Glass, Arvo Pärt and Steve Reich, and their contributions to the Minimalist repertoire. John Adams serves as the director of this *Minimalist Jukebox* festival; partnerships with other local arts institutions enhance the offerings beyond Philharmonic performances.

The Philharmonic's *Minimalist Jukebox* festival features orchestral, world music, and Green Umbrella programs. This cutting-edge style of composition, which broke barriers and redefined the musical and compositional landscape of the classical genre when it was introduced in the mid-1960s, was a rebellion against Modernism and the strict rules of Serialism.

John Adams, director of the festival, comments, "The Minimalist revolution was a defining moment in Western music history. By re-inventing new uses of common musical principles – pulse, repetition, tonality and modality – the Minimalists upended the prevailing modernist aesthetic established by Schoenberg and his followers. Minimalism was also a peculiarly American idea – a rediscovery of the 'pleasure principle' in art music, something that was so often lacking in the grim, theory-bound orthodoxy of the avant-garde."

He continues, "The works of the Minimalists have given a jump start to concert music and have brought composers and their audiences together again in a way not experienced since the 19th century. It's only fitting that the Los Angeles Philharmonic should be the first American orchestra to realize this and to celebrate it."

As part of *Minimalist Jukebox*, the Getty Research Institute and the Los Angeles Philharmonic embark on their second major collaboration, following on the heels of the Building Music project during Walt Disney Concert Hall's inaugural season. Between March 30 and April 2, a series of panel discussions, lectures, symposia and musical events explore Minimalism as movements – sometimes dramatically different – in visual art, music, theater, literature and dance. In addition, the partnership further explores the Minimalist movement in music and the rich artistic collaborations it spawned throughout the art world of the 1960s, '70s and '80s. Further details on these collaborative events will be announced at a later date.

Tom Crow, Director of the Getty Research Institute, comments, "One of the most remarkable features of contemporary culture has been the convergence of ideas among its major art forms. But they haven't been

often enough looked at together, so that their vivid correspondences can be fully understood. That's our goal in this partnership with our colleagues at the Los Angeles Philharmonic."

- John Adams leads the Philharmonic in his own *Harmonielehre* and scenes from Philip Glass' opera *Akhnaten.* (March 31, April 1 and 2, 2006)
- Les Ballets Africains the national ensemble of the Republic of Guinea perform as part of the World Music series (March 22, 2006)
- Reinbert de Leeuw (Los Angeles Philharmonic debut) leads the U.S. premiere of *Racconto dall'Inferno* by his fellow countryman, Louis Andriessen. The program also includes Arvo Pärt's *Tabula rasa* and Andriessen's *De Staat.* (March 24 and 25, 2006)
- Stefan Asbury (Los Angeles Philharmonic debut) conducts the orchestra in works by Steve Reich, including *Proverb* and *Tehillim* with vocal ensemble Synergy. (March 25 and 26, 2006)
- Donald Crockett leads his USC Thornton Contemporary Music Ensemble in a Green Umbrella program of late Minimalist repertoire. (March 28, 2006)
- The Los Angeles Master Chorale is also a Minimalist Jukebox collaborator, offering a concert as
 part of their Walt Disney Concert Hall series. Their program, devised by Master Chorale Music
 Director Grant Gershon with John Adams, includes works by Michael Torke, Meredith Monk and Arvo
 Pärt.
- A special presentation of Minimalist repertoire for keyboard and multiple keyboards, including music by Adams, Andriessen, Cage, Glass, Lang, Pärt and Reich performed by the members of Piano
 Spheres, takes place at Walt Disney Concert Hall. (March 30, 2006)
- In addition, the Philharmonic presents a special performance of Glenn Branca's Symphony No. 13, "Hallucination City," for 100 electric guitars.

BEETHOVEN UNBOUND

The 2005/2006 season begins – and ends – with Beethoven's nine symphonies and a selection of string quartets. With one or two symphonies on each of the six *Beethoven Unbound* programs, Esa-Pekka Salonen also leads contemporary classics by 20th – and 21st – century composers – Dutilleux, Knussen, and Ligeti – as well as newly-commissioned works from Lindberg and Hillborg, which complement Beethoven's masterpieces.

"It's a great moment to do a Beethoven project because our audience can hear these works with a new clarity and intensity of sound," Salonen said. "I see Beethoven as one of the most radical composers of all time. Some of his works may be the most drastic departures from convention and prevailing tradition in the history of music. If there ever was a composer whose music cries for new works to be next to his, that is Beethoven."

- Esa-Pekka Salonen conducts the Philharmonic and special guest pianist **Evgeny Kissin** in an all-Beethoven program for the annual Opening Night Gala. The program features the Egmont Overture and the Fifth Piano Concerto, *Emperor*. (*September 29, 2005*)
- Beethoven's Symphony No. 1 and No. 2 leads off the series with Henri Dutilleux's The Shadows of Time. (September 30, October 1 and 2, 2005)
- Symphony No. 3, *Eroica*, is paired with the world premiere of Magnus Lindberg's new orchestral work (co-commissioned by the Los Angeles Philharmonic Association and the Koussevitzky Foundation). (October 6 and 9, 2005)
- Beethoven's Symphony No. 4 and No. 6, Pastoral, is programmed with Knussen's Violin Concerto, featuring violinist Leila Josefowicz. (October 13, 14 and 16, 2005)
- The Symphony No. 5 and *Leonore* Overture No. 2 are paired with **Lutoslawski's Fourth Symphony**, which was written for the Los Angeles Philharmonic. (*April 28, 29 and 30, 2006*)
- Beethoven's Symphony No. 7 and No. 8 are performed alongside the world premiere of Hillborg's new work for orchestra, which was commissioned by the Los Angeles Philharmonic. (May 4, 5 and 7, 2006)

- Beethoven's Ninth Symphony with vocal soloists Twyla Robinson, Jill Grove, Marcus Haddock, and
 Alan Held is preceded by Ligeti's Requiem (May 11, 13, and 14, 2006)
- A special set of four non-subscription all-Beethoven programs on October 7 and 15 and May 6 and 12 featuring the nine symphonies is available to ticket-buyers in a one-time only package.
- Beethoven Unbound also includes a special set of four concerts surveying many of Beethoven's
 String Quartets performed by the Juilliard String Quartet (October 9 and 11, 2005) and the
 Emerson String Quartet (May 18 and 19, 2006). These ensembles also follow Salonen's approach to
 Beethoven by juxtaposing his early and late quartets with other major works from the 20th and 21st century quartet repertoire.

Additional events:

- The annual **Grand Avenue Festival** features two Philharmonic performances of works by Beethoven (October 8) in special programs for children.
- Members of the Los Angeles Philharmonic perform two all-Beethoven programs as part of the Chamber Music Series. (October 18, 2005 and April 25, 2006)
- Special symposia and recitals are also being scheduled.

ON LOCATION RESIDENCIES

On Location, the Philharmonic's artist residency program, continues during 2005/2006 season with composer Thomas Adès and pianist Leif Ove Andsnes. Each participates in his own residency project, which include orchestral appearances, as well as Green Umbrella, chamber music concerts and other activities.

"Since its initiation three seasons ago, the Philharmonic's *On Location* residencies have welcomed some of the world's most distinguished artists such as Alfred Brendel, Thomas Quasthoff and Midori," says Deborah Borda. "*On Location* has provided a fertile field to explore and expand more fully upon the creative genius of these artists here in Los Angeles. The impact on our musical community, orchestra and audiences is undeniable. We now welcome two of the most celebrated artists of today with a definite bent toward the future – Thomas Adès and Leif Ove Andsnes."

Thomas Adès

Thomas Adès, one of the most celebrated young composers in the world today, joins the Philharmonic for a residency that will span two seasons, extending into the 2006/2007 season.

- The orchestra gives the U.S. premiere (co-commissioned by the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Berlin Festival) of **Thomas Adès** Violin Concerto, performed by **Anthony Marwood** in his Philharmonic debut, as well as the premiere of a new suite (written for this performance) from Adès' opera *The Tempest*. Adès also leads Sibelius' Suite No. 2 from *The Tempest* and Tchaikovsky's *Tempest*. (February 10, 11 and 12, 2006)
- Adès joins members of the Philharmonic at the piano for a chamber music concert featuring music by Schubert and Beethoven. (February 7, 2006)
- Adès conducts a *Green Umbrella* concert which includes three of his own works: Piano Quintet (West Coast premiere), *Origin of the Harp* (U.S. premiere), and Chamber Symphony (West Coast premiere). (February 21, 2006)

Leif Ove Andsnes

Acclaimed Norwegian pianist Leif Ove Andsnes returns to Los Angeles for a two-week residency that explores contemporary works, standard repertoire, and chamber music.

- An all-Mozart chamber music program with members of the orchestra (November 29, 2005)
- Grieg's Piano Concerto with Esa-Pekka Salonen and the Philharmonic. The program also includes repertoire by other Scandinavian composers: Sibelius' *Finlandia* and Stenhammar's Serenade. (December 1, 2 and 3, 2005)
- Andsnes joins the New Music Group in works by Kurtág, led by Salonen and Assistant Conductor
 Alexander Mickelthwate. (December 6, 2005)
- Andsnes performs music of Schubert and Beethoven with tenor lan Bostridge on the Colburn Celebrity Series. (May 3, 2006)

THE ART OF THE GUITAR

During the 2005/2006 season, the Philharmonic takes a wide-ranging look at the versatility of the guitar, exploring the instrument in genres of music from classical to jazz. The guitar's many musical personalities come into focus in this mini-festival's varied repertoire.

- A Django Reinhardt Festival on the Jazz series (November 16, 2005)
- Chamber music featuring members of the Philharmonic and quest quitarists (November 15, 2005)
- Assad Brothers duo-recital (November 17, 2005)
- Eliot Fisk (Los Angeles Philharmonic debut) performs Rodrigo's famed Concierto de Aranjuez with the orchestra under quest conductor Marin Alsop. (November 18, 19 and 20, 2005)

OTHER PROGRAMMING HIGHLIGHTS

El Niño

• Following triumphant performances in Los Angeles and New York in 2002, the Los Angeles Philharmonic brings back *El Niño*, John Adams' nativity oratorio, in a concert version featuring soprano Dawn Upshaw, mezzo-soprano Michelle de Young, bass-baritone Sir Willard White, and countertenors Daniel Bubeck, Paul Flight and Brun Cummings. The Los Angeles Children's Chorus and the Los Angeles Master Chorale join Esa-Pekka Salonen and the Los Angeles Philharmonic for *El Niño's* premiere at Walt Disney Concert Hall. (December 16, 17 and 18, 2005)

Shostakovich Cycle

Esa-Pekka Salonen and the **Los Angeles Philharmonic** complete their five-year survey of the symphonies and string quartets of Dmitri Shostakovich.

- The Shostakovich Cycle continues this season with guest conductor Andrey Boreyko (Los Angeles Philharmonic debut) leading Symphony No. 15, as well as Haydn's Cello Concerto with Alban Gerhardt and Tchaikovsky's Romeo and Juliet. (November 11 and 13, 2005)
- Guest conductor James Conlon leads Symphony No. 13, Babi Yar, with bass Vladimir Ognovenko
 (Los Angeles Philharmonic debut) and the Men of the Pacific Chorale. The program also features
 violinist Hilary Hahn performing Sibelius' Violin Concerto. (January 20 [Shostakovich only], 21 and
 22, 2006)
- Symphony No. 14, which concludes the Cycle, is led by Salonen with guest vocalists soprano
 Tatiana Pavlovskaya (Los Angeles Philharmonic debut) and baritone Matthias Goerne on a program with Mozart's Masonic Funeral Music and Haydn's Symphony No. 103, *Drumroll.* (February 2, 3 and 4, 2006)

Each *Upbeat Live* pre-concert event for these programs features a performance of one of Shostakovich's string quartets by members of the Los Angeles Philharmonic.

Mozart's 250th - A Celebration

In celebration of the 250th birthday of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, the Los Angeles Philharmonic salutes his genius with special all-Mozart programs.

- An all-Mozart chamber music program with pianist Leif Ove Andsnes and members of the Philharmonic (November 29, 2005)
- Guest Conductor Christoph von Dohnányi returns to Los Angeles to lead pianist Andreas Haefliger
 and the orchestra in Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 27, K. 595, and soprano Barbara Bonney, mezzosoprano Ruxandra Donose, tenor Eric Cutler, bass Alfred Reiter, and the USC Thornton Choral
 Artists in the composer's famed Requiem. (February 23, 24 and 25, 2006)
- John Eliot Gardiner brings his **Orchestre Révolutionnaire** et **Romantique** to Walt Disney Concert Hall as part of the *Visiting Orchestra* series, to perform Mozart's final three symphonies: Nos. 39, 40, and 41. (*January 14, 2006*)

First Nights

The 2005/2006 season sees the third installment of First Nights: An Introduction to Great Works series.

• This season, the Los Angeles Philharmonic introduces four new *First Nights* productions including performances of Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 20, K. 466; Shostakovich's Symphony No. 13, *Babi Yar*; Rachmaninoff's Second Symphony; and the world premiere of a new work by Anders Hillborg, a Philharmonic commission. Each evening uses a different format, including multimedia demonstration, theater, and musical analysis, to explore each featured work from a variety of angles.

PREMIERES

Four new works commissioned or co-commissioned by the Los Angeles Philharmonic are given their world premieres by the orchestra or the New Music Group during the 2005/2006 season.

World Premieres

Esa-Pekka Salonen leads three of the four world premieres this season, beginning with the Los Angeles Philharmonic in **Magnus Lindberg's** new orchestral work, which was co-commissioned by the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Koussevitzky Foundation. (October 6 and 9, 2005, as part of Beethoven Unbound)

As part of his *On Location* residency, visiting conductor/composer **Thomas Adès** leads the world premiere of a new suite of music from his opera, *The Tempest. (February 10, 11 and 12, 2006)*

Salonen leads a *Green Umbrella* program that includes the world premiere of Roger Reynolds' *Illusion*, a New Music Group Commission (May 9, 2006); he also conducts the world premiere of Anders Hillborg's Los Angeles Philharmonic-commissioned work for orchestra. (May 4, 5, 7 and 21, 2006)

U.S. Premieres

Esa-Pekka Salonen leads the Philharmonic in a program featuring the U.S. premiere of his own new work. Salonen also conducts the U.S. premiere of **Unsuk Chin's** *Cantatrix Sopranica*, which was cocommissioned by the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the London Sinfonietta, and the St. Polten Festspielhaus, on the May 9, 2006 Green Umbrella program.

Thomas Adès also leads the U.S. premieres of two of his own works, and one by Niccolo Castiglioni. Ades' Violin Concerto was co-commissioned by the Los Angeles Philharmonic Association and the Berlin Festival, and is performed by Anthony Marwood and the orchestra (February 10, 11 and 12, 2006). His Origin of the Harp, for a chamber ensemble of 10 musicians, commissioned by the Hallé Orchestra, is performed by the Philharmonic New Music Group on the Green Umbrella series (February 21, 2006). Ades also leads Castiglioni's Cantus Planus (1990–1991) for two sopranos and seven-piece ensemble, on that Green Umbrella program.

Reinbert de Leeuw leads the U.S. premiere of Louis Andriessen's *Racconto dall'Inferno* (*Tale from The Inferno*) (2004) for voice and orchestra as part of *Minimalist Jukebox* on March 24 and 25. The work, which uses texts from and related to Canto XXI of Dante's *Inferno*, received its world premiere in 2004 in Cologne, under de Leeuw's direction. (*March 24 and 25, 2006*)

• West Coast Premieres

Two of Thomas Adès' works receive their West Coast premieres in the 2005/2006 season: the Piano Quintet (2000) and Chamber Symphony (1990). Both are heard on the Green Umbrella program led by the composer on February 21. 2006. The Piano Quintet was premiered by Adès and the Arditti Quartet in Melbourne, Australia in 2001. The Chamber Symphony, scored for 15 instruments, was first heard in 1991 at the Cambridge Festival of Contemporary Music performed by members of the BBC Philharmonic.
